Les Suites du 33, Champagne

Bubbly lovers can book a luxurious stay in the heart of Épernay at Champagne de Venoge's recently opened historic château located on the Avenue des Champagnes, UNESCO World Heritage site. With the property's five generously styled suites (one is a full apartment), you'll feel like a privileged guest of the family, not a number on a room key. The location is steps from several of the world's most famous Champagne houses, but the best
